

he Stonington Free Library was awarded \$1000 from a Pfizer Community Vibrancy Grant toward the purchase of a new AWE Early Literacy Station in

July. The goal of this grant is to improve school readiness in our community.



The new AWE Early Literacy Station is designed for children ages 2-9.
Its programs meet all State
Education Stand requirements.

The AWE family of self-contained, turn-key computer systems offers a complete digital learning experience with over 60 program options. The programs are correlated with all State Education Standard requirements. The Early Literacy Station is designed for use by children ages 2-9 with over 1,000 different activities designed to instantly engage children. The Station covers the seven curriculum areas of reading, writing, phonics, math and problem solving, science, social studies and the arts. The Early Literacy Station provides a safe and fun learning environment for young children who may or may not have access to a home computer. The Library was an early adopter of this technology and is proud to introduce the latest

addition to the AWE family. We already have 2 Early Literacy stations in the Children's Room, in addition to an After School Edge computer from the AWE line. The new station, with enhanced programs, will help to eliminate waiting times and allow more children access to these very popular learning tools. The Stonington Free Library is most grateful to Pfizer, Inc. and Groton Laboratories for their generous donation and their leadership role in forging corporate and community collaboration.

Gift to Purchase New Playaway View Technology for Children's Room

The Leslie Family has generously contributed money for the purchase of a very popular technology for the Children's Room, Playaway Views. In honor of Archie Leslie's birthday, his wife and children donated funds allowing the Library to buy 18 Playaway Views containing 96 different stories in video. The Playaway View is a portable, self-contained video player which is only available in public libraries. It can be used as a stepping stone in early literacy development, exposing children to various books, rhymes and music. Some are available in both English and Spanish.

Each Playaway View is about the size of a GPS navigation device and weighs less than 6 ounces. When parents check one out of the Library, they will receive the device along with a charger in a case. There is an external speaker in the View and a universal headphone jack for private use, if desired. Each View contains multiple videos, with a total running time of approximately an hour. There are stories for all tastes, both classics, fairy tales and newer titles. This new vehicle for delivering stories is proving to be

immensely popular. Our 18 Views have circulated over 75 times since we purchased them! The Stonington Free Library is thankful to the Leslie family for their very generous and thoughtful donation.

<u>Chelsea Groton Foundation Awards</u> \$500 Grant for Teen Room Furnishing

As another school year begins, we are ready for an exciting season of new programs and the return of perennial favorites. We will continue our Drop In Read and Play story times on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. These story times are designed to introduce and reinforce early literacy skills. Reading, talking, singing, writing and playing are the five practices that form the building blocks of early literacy skills. The Family Literacy Enrichment Program continues to offer four free outreach story times to local preschools and daycare centers along with a rotating library of print and audio books.

Our Saturday in Stonington on Saturday mornings will vary weekly. Lego Saturday will remain the first Saturday of the month and the other weeks will be stories, activities or crafts. Check out our Facebook page to see what is coming up each week. Some highlights are listed below.



Our first Family Craft Workshop, Make a Haunted Gingerbread House on Saturday, Oct 18 is filled. A Duct Tape Workshop run by some of our Teen Volunteers on October 25 is very popular. Make a Plate Week will be the week before Thanksgiving and we will continue our partnership with the Pawcatuck Neighborhood Center by

asking for a food donation for their holiday baskets. Get Fired Up will run a Make a Holiday Ornament at the Library on Wednesday evening, December 10, and

Saturday, December 13. Please sign up for a half hour time slot and have some painting fun. Prices vary with the ornament chosen. And finally, to ward off the January doldrums, there will be a Sharpie Tie Dye Tee Shirt for ages 8 and older on January 31. Please check the calendar for times, ages and registration requirements.



Returning program favorites will be A Visit with Santa and Mrs. Claus, Dad and Me Story time and the fabulous Children's Opera. This year's production is *The* Three Little Pigs. We are very happy that the Lollipop Opera Company will be back at the Mystic Stage for two shows on January 24 at 11 am and 12:45 pm. We will be taking reservations by phone or in person beginning on January 2 at the Library. The opera company will be supplying a template so the children can make their own pig puppet to confuse the Big Bad Wolf. Be sure to make yours and bring it to the performance! Seats go quickly for this annual musical treat.

Our second annual Halloween Costume Swap or Drop had great participation this year. Patrons brought in clean Halloween costumes on a hanger with the size marked and we had free shopping available October 1 – October 10. The hope was that people would find an outlet for outgrown Halloween costumes and be able to choose something new for their child without digging into their wallets. All unclaimed costumes were donated.

50 To Grow On, our early literacy initiative for children 7 and younger, will run December 1 – March 31. The Library will be collaborating with the schools in promoting this enormously popular Winter Reading Challenge, which focuses on developing a family "read aloud" habit.

On the subject of collaboration, we are continuing our Middle School No Stress Book Club at the afterschool IMPACT program at the COMO. We piloted a weekly Library Read Aloud at the COMO's afterschool elementary school groups in October and are considering repeating this program in the new year.

The Library will be hosting the third graders for the annual Look It Up project, which is a partnership between the Rotaries of both of Mystic and the Stoningtons, the Lesley Buck Memorial Fund, and the Library. All the third graders tour the building, listen to a story, and participate in a scavenger hunt. They each receive their own dictionary and library card. This will require closing the Children's Room briefly for a few mornings in the fall; please check our webpage for days and times.

A New Speaker Series: Thoughtful Thursdays



On Thursday, October 9th, the Library launched a new speaker series, "Thoughtful Thursdays." The topic was *Managing Your Digital Life—Using Social Media for Life, Family, And Career Success*, and the speaker was Josh Jensen, Director of Marketing Communications at Connecticut College. It was an absolutely fascinating hour.

Mr. Jensen took his audience through 25 different social media from the well-known Facebook, Twitter, and You Tube to little-known Vine, Yo, and Yik Yak. In each case he explained who uses the medium, what its uses are, its defining features and what to beware of when using it.

He had some stunning statistics: nearly 2/3 of American adults use social media; 40% of cell phone owners use social networking on their phones; Facebook has **829 million daily active users** compared to The Wall Street Journal's 2.4 million daily readers and the New York Times's 1.9 million.

One favorite social network was Flickr with its defining feature being "Lots of storage space for high quality photos." For his presentation, Mr. Jensen had gone into Flickr and searched for photos of Stonington, showing the audience a collection of lovely graphics.

Mr. Jensen emphasized the public nature of social networks and urged circumspection in what a user says and presents. "Make sure what you put on the network is something you'd be proud to show your boss, your spouse, your child," he said. He also advised parents to "Keep tabs" on their children's use of social networks:

- 70% of students see frequent bullying online, only 1 in 10 victims will inform a parent or adult, victims are 2-9 times more likely to consider suicide
- Ask questions, follow and friend, ask for passwords, encourage them to speak up, try out social networks
- Set guidelines: what sites they can visit, who they can friend, what they can say
- Understand school rules

The next in the "Thoughtful Thursdays" series will be Thursday, November 13, 5:30, at the Library. The topic will be *How to Protect Your Personal Information in The Digital Age*, and the speaker will be Bruce Carpenter, Director of Technical Support And Information Security Officer at Connecticut College.
