# HATS OFF TO OUR VOLUNTEERS We Couldn't Do It without You

n this issue of *The Librarian* we're saluting our volunteers. They are many and deeply committed. The fact is, volunteering is alive and thriving at the Stonington Free Library.

Our volunteers include all of our Board members, and committee members. We have teen volunteers in the summer helping with the Summer Reading program. Our programs are provided by volunteers and volunteers help set up for programs. A volunteer designs our posters and volunteers place program posters around town. Our Mystery Dinner fundraiser is successful because of the large number of volunteer committee members, as well as the hosts who offer their homes to us. Our Battle of Stonington 5K Race is an all-volunteer affair. #### Christine Nickerson: She Volunteers Because, "I Love Libraries"

Christine Nickerson might be called our Jackof-All-Trades volunteer. If it needs doing, she does it: manning the front desk, shelving books, answering the telephone, sending faxes, checking books out, checking books in, and, as she puts it, "generally helping patrons." And she's been doing it for 10 years.

She explains, "My love of libraries dates back to my very first volunteer job, shelving books in my elementary school library. When I came back here from Michigan I was looking for a way to connect with the community, a way to get involved, so the Stonington Free Library was the natural answer. And I've been very happy here.

The Library is a haven, a wonderful, warm place where friends meet friends, or just come in to read the paper, or one of our magazines. The patrons are wonderful. They're so interesting, from the seniors to the young mothers with their kids and infants. They're why I love working here. It's such a pleasure to be of help in this environment and have a real effect.

This Library has been serving the community for—how long?—100-150 years? That's a great tradition. And, at the same time, we're very up-to-date with electronic readers, videos, wi-fi, that sort of thing. I have my own Kindle and I love it. I hope I'll be here for the next ten years."

"Our landscaping budget is tiny, and Kathy enables us to spread it out in a way we never could if she didn't donate her time," says Director Margaret Victoria.

Ms. Weinberger's work crews do receive pay, but she doesn't. "It gives me real satisfaction to keep the Green looking well-tended in a way the Library can afford," she says. "We schedule work around the 4th of July and then the Stonington Fair in early August. Those are the times we want to look our best.

"I love libraries. They recycle knowledge and save trees. I've worked in libraries since high school. I worked in the Mystic Library when I first came here from California. I still do landscape work for them as well as for the Stonington Lighthouse.

"I brought my daughter to the children's programs years ago. I have a library card and check out e-books for my Kindle.

"Stonington Free Library is a community hub—a great place where you can read and stay warm in the winter and cool in the summer"

Director Victoria smiles appreciatively, "She gives us her time *and* she donates to the Annual Fund. You can't ask for more than that!"

"I guess you could say we're 'volunteer intensive.' Our committee has 15 members," says Anne. "And on top of what they do individually they have 6 committee meetings from October until the Dinner that go for 2, sometimes 3, hours."

"Yes," adds Chris. "And, of course, the hosts and hostesses are volunteers, too, so that adds up to 36 since we think we'll have 18 venues this year. And you have to remember that the hosts pay for all the food and wine and drinks that they serve. So it's quite a contribution of time and money. And many of them have hosted multiple times!"

In answer to a question, Anne says, "I do it because everyone is so incredible; it's a great group to work with, exciting and fun. And because the Library is so worth supporting."

Chris adds, "Everyone loves working together. We've developed our roles and they mesh and work so well. And it's wonderful the way the community supports this. It's a lot of fun and it does a lot of good."

#### Stephen Bessette Is Race Director of The Battle Of Stonington 5K

Stephen Bessette started the Battle of Stonington 5K Race when he was a board member at the Stonington Historical Society. When he cycled off, he moved the Race to the Library. He has directed the Race for 16 years.

"My mother loved the Library," says Bessette.
"It's a community, it's a home base. Even if you don't use the Library, you feel its impact because it serves the whole population from toddlers to seniors. It's not just a building, it's a pillar of Stonington. It's like a big living room. Plus, the Library also has speakers; it's a forum for discussion.

"I spend about 60 hours on it in total. Early in the year it's an hour here, an hour there, recruit, get insurance. Then in the last week or so it's 10-hour days. You have to be a good organizer, a good promoter, and, most of all, a good cheerleader."

#### MEET MELISSA FLOYD, THE LIBRARY'S NEW DEVELOPMENT COORDINATOR



Melissa Floyd is an interesting, articulate, engaging person. She was born in Stonington, graduated from Stonington High School, earned her B.A. in Biology with a minor in Environmental Science from Bryn Mawr College in Pennsylvania.

After college, she served two years in the Peace Corps in Ivory Coast, West Africa; then returned to Northern California where she spent 10 years developing a land-use planning consultancy to assist municipalities.

In 2011, she came home to her roots and set a new career course as a fundraising consultant at the Bill Memorial Library in Groton. Early in 2013, she learned that the Stonington Free Library was offering a part time staff position as Development Coordinator and, after interviewing, took the job. She also continues to consult at Bill Memorial Library.

"Stonington Free Library is very dependent on private donations—in fact, its percentage of private support is among the highest in the state. So naturally that's where I put most of my effort," Ms. Floyd explains. "I interact with the Board of Trustees—the Development Committee. For one thing, we're trying to develop relationships with local


businesses. Last year, before I got here, they ran a series of talks about estate planning that was a success, so we intend to do more along those lines. Also, we'll be doing more to emphasize the Babcock-Phelps Society to recognize persons who leave posthumous gifts to the Library in their wills.

"I also want to work on the Web site and add a page dedicated to fundraising. Electronic access is a wonderful thing for a small library that's constrained by its physical size. With our ability to download to Kindles and other e-readers, the Library is not as dependent on the amount of shelf space we have.

"And we're expanding our social media presence. People say that Libraries should fear the Web, but I think quite the contrary. The Web expands our presence and enables our outreach. We put out an end-of-year e-blast asking patrons to support the Annual Appeal and it got a positive response."
