ABOUT PEOPLE LIKE US by Michael Erickson:

Commissioned by Plays for Living ($^{\text{TM}}$) in 1994 to address diversity and racism in the workplace; the play quickly became one of Plays for Living's most popular programs in a variety of venues for well-over a decade. *People Like Us* explores the challenging and highly charged issues that confront society today. Set around a multi-cultural workplace and related locales, the play shows subtle, not-so-subtle and systematic ways that racism plays out in the characters' lives. There are no easy solutions; however, the play sets the stage for discussing the many actions that may be taken to successfully address the issues. Not only awareness raising, the play is a quality theatrical event that is productive a tool for social change.

THE FACILITATORS

Elijah Manning, Co-Facilitator/Dave Davis in People Like Us: Growing up in a mixed family in Old Saybrook gave Elijah a unique perspective on ethnicity and cultures. He experienced the differences between people in the community. His family has a longstanding history in the town and it made for a very welcome experience, mostly, but every now and then he would experience what he would later come to realize as moments of racism. As he pursued acting and theater, Elijah was always aware of his own look being a question. He has been asked "what are you?" more times than he can count. Knowing that he was seen as a non-white individual taught him to embrace his differences. While he did have his run-ins with racism, he never let it slow down his desire to not conform to other peoples' ideas of who he is. Elijah now takes his experiences and knowledge, as well as his empathy and desire, to make change in our communities, finding ways to continue to learn and grow. He believes that the only true ways to break down barriers between us is to spend time having conversations and learning about one another. Elijah recently joined the staff of Veterinary Emergency Group (VEG) as its DEI Associate to train its staff across the country in diversity, equity and inclusion. VEG has 27 ERs for pets in 10 states, treats over three hundred thousand pet emergencies each year.

Emma Palzere-Rae, Co-Facitator/*People Like Us* Director: Emma brings a wealth of theater and social change experience. Most relevant is her experience as Artistic Director for NYC's Plays for Living, where she produced and toured numerous plays on a variety of issues, including domestic violence, caregiving, work/live balance, and sexual harassment. During her tenure, *People Like Us* was in demand and Emma toured the country facilitating discussions of the play in corporate and community settings. Emma is also a professional theater artist and an active member of Actors Equity Association and the Dramatists Guild.
